Station 1: College Principal, Derek O'Donoghue and staff member Thea Broderick welcomed people to the Open Day.

Stations 2, 3 and 4: College mechanisation staff, Shane Ryan, John Davern, Colm Egan, Jer Enright and Tadhg

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Brosnan gave an outline of our Teagasc Level 6 Advanced Certificate in Agriculture – Mechanisation course, our Higher Certificate in Agriculture – Mechanisation and Bachelor in Engineering courses, the latter two which we deliver in association with TUS (Technological University of the Shannon: Midlands Midwest).

Station 6: College teachers John Flannery and Cillian Ferris gave an account of the drystock enterprise on the farm and how the colleges 550 acres and 700 livestock are used on a daily basis in our teaching on the Teagasc Level 6 Advanced Drystock Management course.



Station 7: College teachers Richard Williams and Cian Haddock outlined the Teagasc Level 6 Advanced Dairy Herd Management course to visitors on the day. An account of the recent development in the dairy farmyard was also given. Visitors were treated to a milking demonstration in the new rotary milking parlour.

Our courses have a very significant practical element to them and when possible we deliver much of our courses on the farm, in the farmyards and in the workshops.
